They'll Know We are Lutherans by our ...

from Pastor Fouts

Every 3 years since 1980 Lutheran youth from all over the country and even the globe have gathered in one of our country's large convention cities. Recent gatherings have numbered close to 25,000 Lutheran youth. It is interesting to think it is highly likely that among them are 35 future District Presidents, one future President of Synod, 500 future pastors, 1,000 future church workers, and 24,464 future Christians living every day lives just like you. Also among the interesting things is the sight of 25,000 high school youth all carrying the same brightly colored free backpack that the organizers gave away. So was born the expression in these convention cities, "They'll know we are Lutheran's by our backpacks."

My question for you this month is how is this statement completed here at St. John. In Battle Creek or Norfolk, "They'll know we are Lutherans by our _____." I want us to think about this question. How do people in our community see our church? How do people who have lived here their whole lives see our religious practices? Do they even know where this Lutheran church is? How do people who are new to our community hear about St. John? What do people new to Battle Creek think about the Lutheran Church? They'll know we are Lutherans by our...

The trend of 21st century religion in America is for a church that feels good, a church that is 'fun.' As we look at the churches growing in America we see churches growing and thriving and as Lutherans we look where we should, at their teachings and say to ourselves, "how sad." While this is happening they are looking at us and saying, "how sad." Liturgical church bodies, like the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, are seen today as a boring church, and a church with absolutely no fun. As an example one night on vicarage after confirmation class I walked out to the snow pile where the kids were having a snowball fight. I picked up a snowball, I tossed a few snowballs, and one of the kids said, "Vicar threw a snowball!" Almost as if it was not possible for Vicar's to throw snowballs. We just are not thought of as a fun group. You never hear anyone say, "They'll know we are Lutherans by our fun."

We have earned the reputation of being a little curmudgeony, of being sticks-in-the-mud. For some people, our attitude appears to be lacking joy and we seem to love no one but ourselves. My friends, is that what church is supposed to be like? What would you imagine a gathering of people filled with hope, filled with Christ might look like? What would it look like if our church was recognized by love? Love for others, more than our selves. Isn't that what Jesus did, and what Jesus taught?

"This is my commandment, that you have sound doctrine for each other." "This is my commandment, that you have fun with each other." The real Jesus quote says, "This is my commandment, that you love on another." Loving one another means dying to ourselves.

When your child complains about the food you prepare for them or the toys you give them, does it sound like love? Of course not. Most of us as parents want our children to be a little more grateful and respectful. What we truly want from them is to love themselves less and others more; to love their providers and their God more than themselves.

What does the curmudgeon expression on my face communicate? What does my lack of joy say? What does the absence of gratitude convey? It does not communicate the love of Christ.

Imagine a community recognized by selfless love of Christ and others. Imagine if St. John was renowned for the overflowing love of her community. The attractiveness of the church, of ministry in our community is in the selfless love of Jesus and his followers. They'll know we are Christians by our love. With Valentine's Day in February, love in the air. "Let us not love in words or talk, but in deed and in truth," 1 John 3:18.

Greetings of Peace in the Church.

Every year whether it is cold/flu season or just hay-fever season, whenever people start coughing, people start getting uncomfortable with the greetings of peace in the Divine Service. It would have been a challenge for some people to be a Christian in the first century. Paul's admonition to Christians in Rome, Corinth and Thessalonica repeatedly references their greetings. "Greet one another with a holy kiss." (Romans 16:16, 1 Corinthians 16:20, 2 Corinthians 13:12, 1 Thessalonians 5:26). While the kiss was prescribed for the first century churches it was done as a culturally appropriate sign of fellowship in the body of Christ. This is more than just a greeting, it is an expression of the mutual affection, brotherhood and unity experienced between Christ's followers. In our culture today, the "holy handshake" has replaced the kiss as a culturally appropriate greeting, but in the gathering of believers, whether a kiss or a handshake or any other greeting it is of great importance to the church. We live in an isolating society. Look at the automation we experience in our lives: the automated tellers, cashiers and callers we interact with on such a regular basis that we seem to be going out of our way to avoid human interaction. Gathered in God's name, we are by that name compelled to be in relationship with our fellow worshippers. Gathered in His name and in His house around His table and in His presence, we find ourselves free for a moment from the warring madness of a godless society and in the presence of a peace-filled brotherhood. It is meet and proper that we greet one another with a holy kiss or whatever other culturally appropriate greeting there is. That being said, we of course respect individuals and their desires for more or less physical contact. If you personally do not wish to greet with a handshake or a hug (or a kiss) we encourage you to greet with words. We also encourage you to be sensitive to those you are greeting who prefer a greeting without contact, and respect those wishes. If you are concerned you might have been contagious, of course, common sense dictates you avoid infecting others to the best of your abilities. It would be ridiculous for us to think for a moment that outside of an isolation bubble, completely prevent the transmission of infectious agents; but it would also be a Satanic victory if we allowed this fear to cease our fellowship or the proclamation of peace in the presence of Christ among us.



In case you did not know every Sunday morning on KCAU, channel 9, out of Sioux City, there is an LCMS sermon and program broadcast. This can be especially helpful for you if you are ill or homebound, or if weather limits your travels. Recently Pastor Fouts and others in the Norfolk circuit recorded sermons which will be broadcast in the weeks and months ahead. (Pastor Fouts is set to be broadcast on Sunday, February 23.)

January 26, 2020 Voters Meeting Minutes

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Randy Sunderman at 12:00 P.M. Pastor B.J. Fouts gave an opening devotion and prayer.

Dennis Roewert made a motion to approve Natasha Onnen as a voting member. Second by Dave Praeuner. Motion carried.

Nick Onnen gave a review of St. John's fiscal responsibility, the benefits of smaller students to teach ratio, projected class sizes over the next three years, tuition changes over the last nine years, tuition income over the last 5 years, the congregation to school ratio for the cost of St. John Lutheran School, and the cost of additional staffing for the 2020-2021 school year.

Nick Onnen talked about potential class spaces for where the students would go if 7th and 8th grade were split up for the 2020-2021 school year, regardless of any expansion plans. Mr. Onnen talked about the need to hire/call a language arts teacher and to call a math teacher and a science teacher, creating another teaching position on the staff.

Deanna Anderson made a motion to approve the hiring or calling of a language arts teacher and the calling of a math teacher and a science teacher. Second by Deborah Sunderman. Motion carried.

The interview committee (Nick Onnen, Brian Wysocki, and Larry Moenning) reviewed candidates Kim Schauer (language arts), Tia Pawlowski (language arts), Thomas Hinrichs (math), and Daniel Gibson (science/math).

A ballot was conducted to determine the preferred language arts candidate between Kim Scheuer and Tia Pawlowski. Randy Sunderman shared the ballot results: Tia Pawlowski received 29 votes and Kim Scheuer received 13 votes.

Another ballot was conducted to determine the preferred math candidate between Thomas Hinrichs and Daniel Gibson. Randy Sunderman shared the ballot results: Thomas Hinrichs received 33 votes and Daniel Gibson received 6 votes.

A third ballot was conducted to determine if a call should be extended to Daniel Gibson for the science position. Randy Sunderman shared the ballot results: 20 votes to extend the call and 20 votes to not extend the call and have the board look for other candidates. Due to a tie, a call will not be extended to Daniel Gibson at this time and the board will look for additional candidates.

Deborah Sunderman made a motion to extend a contract to Tia Pawlowski. Second by Dave Praeuner. Motion Carried.

Ronald Buckendahl made a motion to extend a call to Thomas Hinrichs. Second by Mike Anderson. Motion Carried.

Nick Onnen gave an update on the building expansion project – we are waiting for bids to come in.

Pastor Fouts mentioned that the call list for the associate pastor position has been narrowed and the call committee plans to conduct interviews in the near future.

Dave Praeuner moved to adjourn the meeting. Second by Ronald Buckendahl. Motion carried.

The voters meeting was concluded with the Lord's Prayer.

The next church council meeting will be on February 17th.



It's official! St. John will be splitting their last combination classroom in 2020-2021

On Sunday, January 26th, St. John's Voters' Assembly approved the addition of a middle-school teacher to split the 7th & 8th grades! This has some significant implications.

1. It's an additional commitment from St. John Church. We have tremendous support! As a school, we have tried to spread out the costs of the school so neither the church nor our school families took on too great of a financial burden. This is the primary reason why tuition and fees have slowly increased over the last several years. This staffing addition is likely the last major position the school will look to add for several years to come.

2. We're out of space. We have been out of space for a while. Currently, we're utilizing the computer lab, the modular classroom, and Mr. Onnen's Office once per day for classrooms. Next year, we'll need yet another space. In the next week, St. John's Building Committee will be reviewing plans from contractors. The committee will then discuss options and make a recommendation to the Voters' on how we proceed.

Finally, St. John's Voters' extended a call and issued a contract to two phenomenal candidates on Sunday. Please keep Thomas Hinrichs, and Tia Pawlowski in your prayers as they deliberate God's will for their future! We're also reviewing files for the 3rd candidate, likely a science teacher.

Pre-Enrollment for the 2020-21 School year Opens February 3rd

It is again time for pre-enrollment for next school year. Why so early? It helps our school be good stewards by planning and budgeting appropriately. We pass along a discount to those pre-enrolling because it helps us be responsible with our resources.

There is an increase in total fees for next year. There are a few contributing reasons for this:

1. As the school grows, the expenses grow with it. The Board of Parochial Education has the job of trying to set prices that are reasonable for our families, but also ensuring we don't drain our primary funding agent, St. John Lutheran Church. The church pays for over 70% of the cost to educate each child.
2. We're intending on splitting our last dual-graded classroom next year. This means we'll add on a full-time staff member, which makes the budget increase more sharply than most years.

If upcoming fees are a financial burden, please talk with Mr. Onnen. Need-based scholarships are available. Last year, roughly \$20,000 was awarded in financial aid!

NOT A TYPICAL MARCH DAY...

March 13, 2019 seemed like every other day. I rose early, packed my bag and headed for my job at 6:45 to Randolph Public Schools.

A mile from Osmond I drove through water on US Highway 20. I said a prayer because I didn't know what to do. I called my husband and he advised me to come home. As stated in Philippians 4:6-7: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your request be made know to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus".

My prayer was answered. It was good I listened to the Lord. Otherwise I would not have seen my husband for three days. By 2:30 pm, our basement windows were crashing in and seven feet of ice flood water occupied our lower level.

We decided to evacuate, but by that time our escape route was blocked. Electrical breakers were cut, emergency heat and lighting were set up, and we placed our cares in the hands of the Lord. 1st Peter 5:7 was our resting point..."Cast all your cares upon Him, for He careth for you." It was a long night in Osmond, Nebraska as we rode out a flood and a blizzard the next day. Many lost so much but we saw a community, like other communities around us, come together and help each other out.

As stated in [Luke 6:38](#) "Give, and it will be given to you. Good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For with the measure you use it will be measured back to you." We learned those following days, God is good and he will supply you with what you need if you ask and believe.

Many lost so much those next few days. But I look back at all the volunteers that took their time and loss of wages to help all to recover. I cannot thank God enough.

Several days later we gathered at Christ Lutheran Church in rural Columbus, NE to bury James Wilke, one of my husband's relatives. Pastor Aaron Witt spoke of a hero. He died in helping others. John 15:13 King James Version seems appropriate here. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

I turn to the bible when I feel panic about this upcoming March. Matthew 11:28 (CEB)_"Come to me, all you who are struggling hard and carrying heavy loads and I will give you rest." I believe the Lord will give us only what we can handle, with his help, and Christian friends who will make the load light.

What I have learned from the flood. Stuff doesn't matter. God loves you unconditionally, and we need to thank Him every day for the graces he bestows upon us.

Without the flood, I would not have retired and I would not be here today as a teacher. I could never have imagined his plan, but I thank Him for all the great people that surround me with their unconditional love and acceptance. I know I am a better Christian for the opportunity to teach here at St. John.

My prayer is that anyone that has been affected by the flood express to others around you that it's bothering you. You have a wonderful support system with your Christian friends that will pray for you. I will especially watch my students the next two months to see if they have trouble concentrating in March. I will remind them that God is good and will take care of them.




