Thoughts from our Pastor

Grace, mercy, and peace to you in Christ, amen! As we wrap up summer and prepare for the start of school in August. We look forward to some opportunities to be the hands and feet of Jesus. Romans 10:14-15 asks the questions, "How can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? Pastor's Approach to the Divine Call, its doctrine and practice.

Brothers and sisters in the faith,

June 13, I announced that I had received a Divine Call to St. James Lutheran Church in Quincy, IL. I will be visiting Quincy the weekend of July 4, and I have committed to prayerfully deliberating and making a decision on or around July 5. This is now the 6th time in my pastoral career I have had the privilege of receiving a call to serve and the opportunity to deliberate regarding God's use of my abilities in His Kingdom. Each time I have this opportunity I take time to review the doctrine and practice of the Divine Call. This being the first opportunity I have had since entering ministry here at St. John, I wish to take this opportunity to share with you some of this review.

First: We believe that God issues calls. As with most things in the church today, He uses some type of earthly means to accomplish this. In most cases it is a congregation or calling body and their call committee and voters' assembly who serve as the Lord's agents to issue a call. Just as in 2016, the Lord worked through the voters' assembly of St. John Battle Creek to extend a Divine Call for me to serve in this congregation, so also the same Lord of the Church has issued an additional call to serve through another Church and their voters' assembly. Both of the calls I currently hold in my hands are calls from the Lord; and both of these calls are God's Will. It is not as if God has decided it is no longer His will for me to serve at St. John, not yet, anyway, but it is clear at this point that God would like me to serve in one of these two places. Earlier in my career, I was blessed with the opportunity to serve two separate calls simultaneously because the distance between the congregations and their willingness to partner, enabled that arrangement. Unfortunately, in this case, I cannot serve both of these calls, and so when the Lord leads me to choose between these two calls, I will have to decline/resign one of them.

Second: The congregation alone has the right to call its pastor. District Presidents, Circuit Visitors, Vacancy Pastors, Call Committees, other pastors and even individual lay members may suggest or provide input into the call process, but the congregation alone has the right to call. When a congregation completes their pre-call survey, that District President prayerfully searches through the roster of all LCMS pastors and then compares their skills and the needs of the congregation so that he may suggest 10-20 names for the call list. Individuals within the congregation will also request to add certain names to that list and unless the district president has information to prevent them from considering that candidate he will include him on their call list. From there the congregation, through whatever means they usually use (call committee, elders, interviews, questionnaires, internet research, or casting lots) brings all or a portion of the list and recommendations to the voters of the congregation who then exercise their right to extend a call. The pastor does not "choose the call." In certain situations a pastor may request to have his name sent out more frequently (placed on call lists), or may request a certain area of the country or a certain type of ministry, but it is very rare that a pastor can place his own name on a call list. I would like to inform you that at this time I have not requested that my name generally be placed on call lists with more frequency. About a year ago, having been in service at St. John for four years, I was asked to update my status from "Unable to consider" to "Would Consider" a call. "Would Consider" is not the same as "Seeking" another call. Estimates show that there will be an exponentially increasing shortage of pastors over the next 5 years. If the Lord leads me to return/ decline the call to Quincy, it is likely there may be another call. That is up to the Lord of the Church, and His congregations.

Third: We believe in the doctrine of vocation. Everything we get to do as God's children is in service to God. I serve God as a husband, father and as a pastor (not to mention teacher, friend, softball coach, citizen, football referee, etc.) We all have dozens of vocations and we are called to serve the Lord in each one of them. The banker serves the Lord just as well as the teacher; the garbage collector serves the Lord just as well as the pastor. As we know there are a variety of gifts and services but the same Lord works them in each of us. All vocations are equal in regards to whom we serve in fulfilling them, but our vocations are not equal in prioritization. In the order of creation, God establishes priorities for vocations. First I am a child of God. I am redeemed, saved, beloved by Jesus. Second are my vocations in family: husband, father, brother, uncle, etc. Third come my vocations to society/creation: I am a citizen. Finally come my vocations in employment: I am a pastor. In evaluating the Divine Call, I must understand that God does not ask me to sacrifice a more highly prioritized vocation for a lesser one. Just as the farmer who forsakes his relationship with Jesus for the sake of pulling in the harvest is to be rebuked, so is the pastor who forsakes his relationship with his family for the sake of the congregation he serves. As I have said before, 6,000 LCMS pastors could serve either of these congregations, but only 1 man is called to be Mr. Jessica Fouts, and only 1 man can be the biological father to my four children. This consideration cannot be overlooked in the Divine Call Process.

Fourth: The Lord's ways are not our ways. Maybe you have an opinion about this call, and maybe even you've expressed that opinion. As God opens doors for ministry opportunities, He also provides opportunities for pastors and congregations to re-evaluate their ministries, their skills, gifts, and priorities. My wife and I did not realize how much we valued Lutheran Schools for our children until the Lord opened our eyes through one of those previous 5 calls which was to a location without a school option. For me as a pastor, I take this time to evaluate what has been my pastoral practice and what skills have been refined in the last few years, how have I changed since I came to St. John? Am I now a better fit somewhere else? At the same time, wise congregations look at their ministry as well. If the Lord leads the pastor to leave, what impact has that pastor had on our next pastorate? If the Lord leads the pastor to stay, what exciting opportunities do pastor and people have together? Stay or Go, there are opportunities, both for pastor and people.

Finally, what do I need/want from you? A high school student, here at St. John did something in the last two weeks that I almost could have never imagined when I was that age. This student came up to me, apart from other people and told me not just whether I should stay or go, but told me why. By telling me the impact the Lord is accomplishing through my time of service here, that student gave me things to pray about and consider. What do I need from you? Your prayers and your encouragement. Pray for wisdom and discernment. If the Lord moves you into a conversation with me about the call and its process, let's discuss ministry, what has been happening at St. John and where you see St. John moving in the next year or five. The Lord has given me the blessing of two opportunities to serve His Church. I hope that this article has given you some prayer direction, as well as some insight into the calling process and my personal deliberative process. I welcome any and all conversations and questions, and I appreciate your prayers.

Spiritual Growth Assessment – Congregation Report

Every day McDonalds sells 6 million hamburgers. The local burger joint probably sells 50 a day. Which one makes better hamburgers? The difficulty with the business of church ministry: how does the church count success? The church cannot count success by attendance, baptisms, membership or any of the traditional, secular methods because as the Scripture tells us, "men will acquire for themselves teachers to suit their own passions;" and "we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block." If the church is "successful" at Her mission, She will drive unrepentant sinners away from Her midst. Measuring true faith and repentance are simply impossible in the "invisible" or "hidden" Church. For the congregation to make the best use of time and talent, in an effort to provide metrics for ministry, St. John Lutheran Church is experimenting with the Spiritual Growth Assessment process.

The Spiritual Growth Assessment uses a self-reporting assessment from the church's members to report on various aspects of Spiritual Growth. Recognizing that spiritual growth and development is a process not an accomplishment (a journey not a destination,) individual Christians are asked to assess their own personal spiritual growth at a specific point in time. Collecting a self-assessment approximately every six months allows the church leaders to look for trends over time and evaluate ministry efforts.

So far the assessment has been recorded twice, the summer/fall of 2020 and the spring/summer of 2021. In the previous round, only 17 respondents completed the assessment. In the second data collection period, 25 respondents returned the assessment. This is too small of a sampling size to accurately evaluate data received. The next sampling is scheduled for December 2021/January 2022, and the goal is to receive at least 50 responses.

Below is the summary report. Mild to slight improvements reflect a slight-edge growth in areas of worship & Bible Study; while mild to slight deteriorations reflect a potential short-coming in evangelism and fellowship. Improvements in the area of Stewardship indicate a tremendous growth period. The final question of the assessment, attempting to grasp the overall mission and ministry, during this sampling period shows a deterioration. The previous results may have been skewed higher due to the novelty of the assessment.

The sampling size is approximately 9% of the average attendance. While this number falls within the national average for survey results, the true percentage (2.6%) of members who completed the assessment is too small a number. Recommended Goals: Encourage and solicit greater number of responses at the next data collection point.

The new edition would also allow LHNE to repurpose the existing science lab into a multi-curricular classroom and would include a restroom to service both gyms and the Fine Arts wing.
